Wind power in Turkey

The wind power plant of the project operator Eskoda Enerji has a total installed capacity of 50 MW and will generate about 166 GWh of electricity annually. The project is located in the districts of Karacabey and Erikli Yayla in the villages of Üçtepeler, Göktepe, Küçükçıplaktepe and Çıplaktepe.

Compared to the baseline situation of the Turkish electricity system, this amount of electricity generation will result in a reduction of carbon dioxide emissions of about 96,563 tonnes per year. In addition to CO_2 emissions, the project will also reduce SO_x and NO_x emissions generated by electricity generation in coal-fired power plants.

The project will help Turkey to promote and commercialise the use of gridconnected technologies and the renewable energy market.

In addition, the project will demonstrate the feasibility of grid-connected wind farms that can contribute to improved energy security, improved air quality, an alternative sustainable energy future, improved local livelihoods and sustainable development of the renewable energy industry.
